

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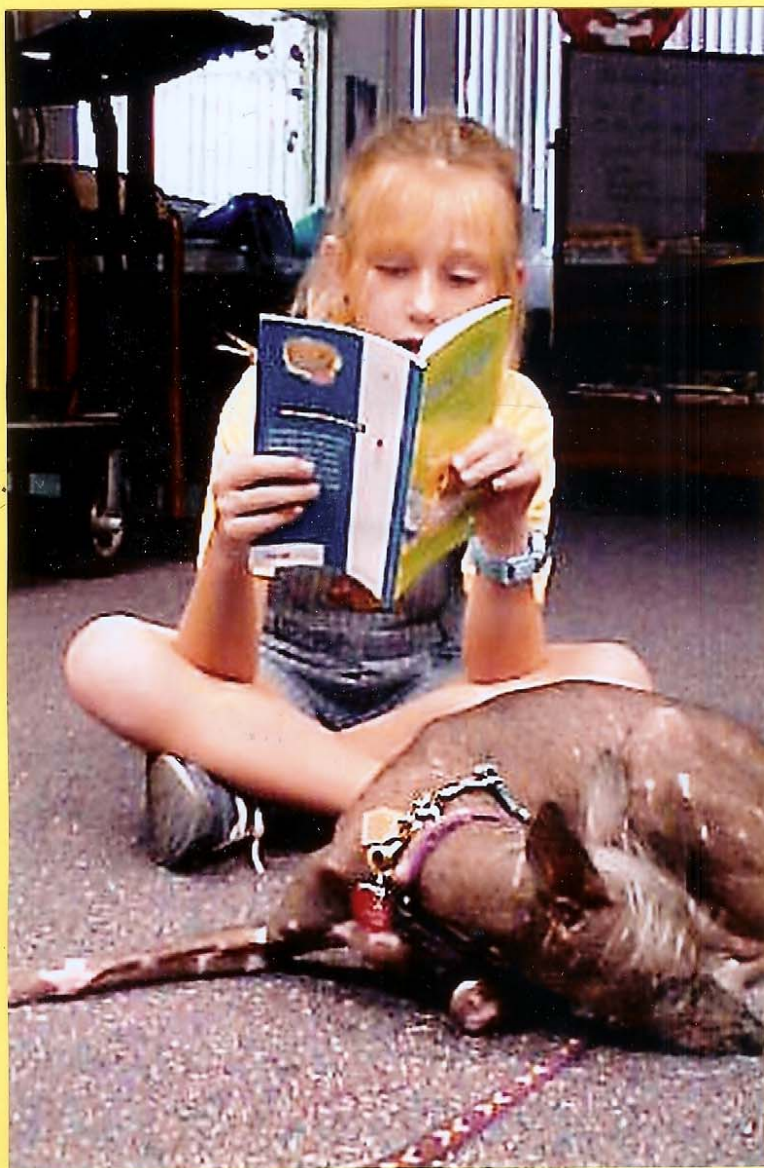

Permission for C.A.R.E. To Read program:

Your child has been selected to participate in the C.A.R.E. To Read® program. This innovative program utilizes Registered Therapy Dogs to motivate students to read. An adult registered Therapy Dog Handler will bring their Registered Therapy Dog to school and will be paired with your child in a supervised setting within the school. During each session your child will read to the Registered Therapy Dog and Handler. Programs such as this have proven successful around the country and within the Brevard County Public Schools. The effectiveness of this program will be closely monitored by Brevard County Public Schools and professionals from the University of Central Florida by examining the test score data of your child over time. During the course of this program it may be necessary for documentary or news purposes to photograph or video your child as he or she participates.

Things Taste Better at Home

WHY DOES A third of the food sent into space come back to Earth uneaten? The problem may be physiological: Some astronauts insist taste buds function differently in orbit. Others cope with motion sickness and stressed-out stomachs.

Then there's the food itself. It's preserved using techniques that are perfectly safe, and studies of returning astronauts show they get the nutrients they need. But irradiation and freeze-drying don't always yield foods with authentic flavors and juiciness.



POPULAR SCIENCE sampled a strip steak, with salt applied in a liquid solution, as in orbit. The meat was dry and, to be charitable, chewy. Lemonade out of a foil pouch had metallic overtones. And cottage cheese with nuts had the texture of spackle. All of which is why NASA is looking forward to refrigerators and freezers on the new station.—*M.D.U.*

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Roy D. Bridges, Jr. Center Director

Roy D. Bridges, Jr., became the Director of NASA's John F. Kennedy Space Center on March 2, 1997. He is responsible for managing all NASA's facilities and activities at the Kennedy Space Center related to processing and launch of the Space Shuttle, processing and integrating NASA payloads flown on both the Shuttle and Expendable Launch Vehicles (ELVs), final tests and preparations of International Space Station (ISS) and experiments elements to be delivered to the ISS by Shuttle, and developing spaceport and range technologies to improve safety and reduce the cost of access to space. Kennedy Space Center is also responsible for the acquisition and launch of all NASA's expendable launch vehicles from launch sites in Florida, California, and Alaska. He manages a team of approximately 1,800 NASA civil service employees and 12,000 contractor employees.

Bridges is a retired U.S. Air Force Major General who held many key space-related roles during his career. Prior to his last USAF assignment at Wright-Patterson Air Force Base, he was the Commander, Air Force Flight Test Center, Edwards Air Force Base, CA. He also was Commander, Eastern Space and Missile Center, Patrick Air Force Base, FL; and Commander, 412th Test Wing, Edwards Air Force Base, CA.

As a NASA Astronaut, he piloted the Space Shuttle Challenger on mission STS-51F in July 1985.

He is a distinguished graduate of the U.S. Air Force Academy, Colorado Springs, CO, earning a bachelor's degree in engineering science. He received a master of science degree in astronautics from Purdue University, IN, in May 2001, he received an honorary doctorate of engineering degree from Purdue, and in May 2003, he received an honorary doctorate of science degree from Florida Institute of Technology.

He has received numerous awards and honors. Most recently, he was awarded NASA's Outstanding Leadership Medal and the Presidential Meritorious Executive Award.

Bridges was born in Atlanta, GA, but grew up in Gainesville, GA. He currently resides in Cocoa Beach, FL. He is married to the former Benita Louise Allbaugh of Tucson, AZ. They have two adult children and two grandchildren.

"Take Our Children to Work Day"
NASA, John F. Kennedy Space Center
July 24, 2003

Today I went to "Take Our Children to Work Day" at NASA Kennedy Space Center. Ms. Melanie Chan is the NASA Research and Development Manager, and she invited me to be her daughter for the day. She is an Aerospace Engineer, and she worked on the Space Shuttle for a long time.

Before we went to the Space Center, we went by Ms. Melanie's house so I could see Inti and 2 of the new puppies. Inti kissed me! I go to hold the puppy. He is 6 weeks old.

First of all, we stopped at the guard gate at Cape Canaveral Air Force Station (CCAFS). The guards looked at my security badge to make sure I was okay to go in. I think the guard knew Ms. Melanie, and they looked at me in the back seat and said, "Are you sisters?" Ms. Melanie said, "Of course, don't we look just alike? Well, we are friends." The guard was nice and said for us to have a fun day.

We went to Ms. Melanie's office in the O&C Building (Operations and Checkout). We met the Secretary, and she told me about her work and how she takes care of everyone, like making sure everyone gets paid. Next we went to the Chemistry Lab, and a scientist named Steve showed us a scorpion, spider, rhino beetle, and dragonflies under a Scanning Electron Microscope. Everything was 10x to 100x bigger than in real life.

Next was Headquarters, where I had fingerprints made by Security. Then outside in the hot sun we met a police dog and got to hold high-power rifles used by the SWAT team. I also got in the special vehicle that NASA uses for crew rescue for the Shuttle. It is from Sweden, and it can go through mud and float on water. Ms. Melanie took a picture of me in the firefighter's suit, which was heavy and hot! The fireman gave me some stickers.

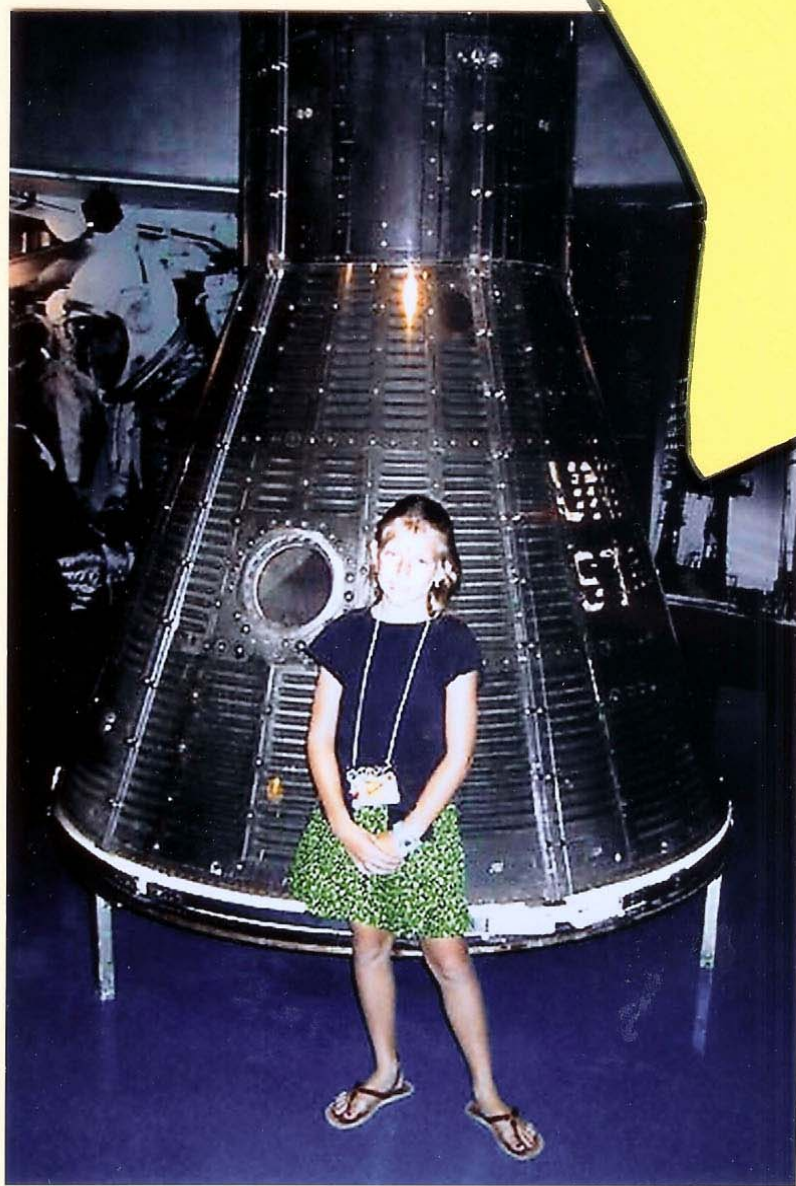
The best thing was next. I got to meet the Center Director of NASA KSC. His name is Mr. Roy Bridges. He used to be an astronaut. Mr. Bridges and his Secretary gave me 3 patches and 3 pins and 2 pictures, all from Shuttle missions. One was from the last mission of Columbia, the one that exploded and never came back to Earth.

We walked back to Ms. Melanie's office, and we met the boss, who is a chemist, Ms. Karen Thompson. Finally we had lunch! We went to the cafeteria, and it was really fun.

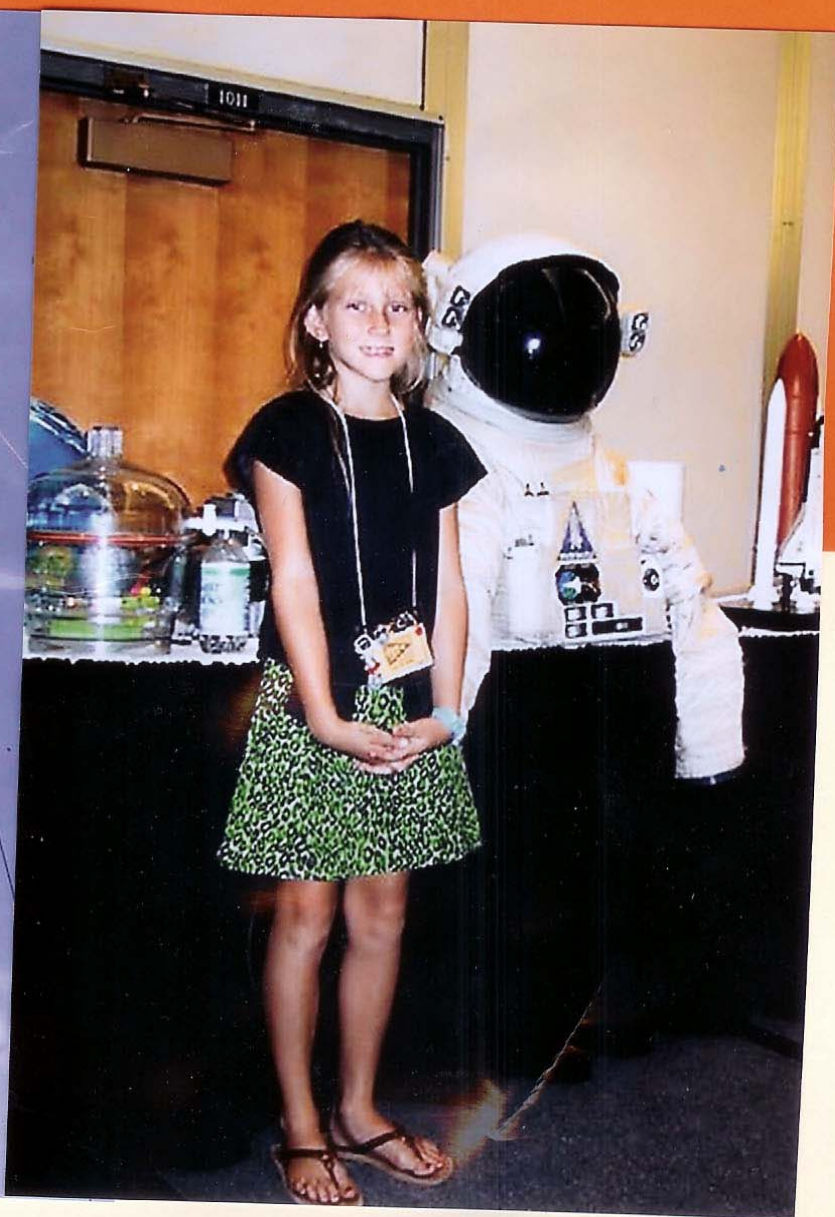
Dr. Martha Williams, a chemist, told me about polymers, and showed me some examples of new materials that she is working on. She also gave me space stickers and pins. I got to meet a lot of lady scientists. They told me about the work they do.

After lunch we drove to the Debus Center at the Visitor's Center where the tourists go. We got to go in a special place where the tourists cannot go. I heard some engineers talk about what they do and what kind of things they studied in school. They also talked about how they got interested in their jobs.

Ms. Melanie took my picture in the Rocket Garden while we waited for the science demonstration to start. A lady teacher gave the demo, and I learned about things like gravity, how far it is from the Earth to the moon, and what can happen to the astronauts if they go to space without a space suit.



I needed a special badge to wear the whole time we were up there. I received pins from different people that I met. And I put them on my badge. I got to meet Roy Bridges, JR. he is the director of N.A.S.A. KSC. He gave me patches, pictures and a special gold shuttle pin. Even Mrs. Melanie doesn't have this special pin.

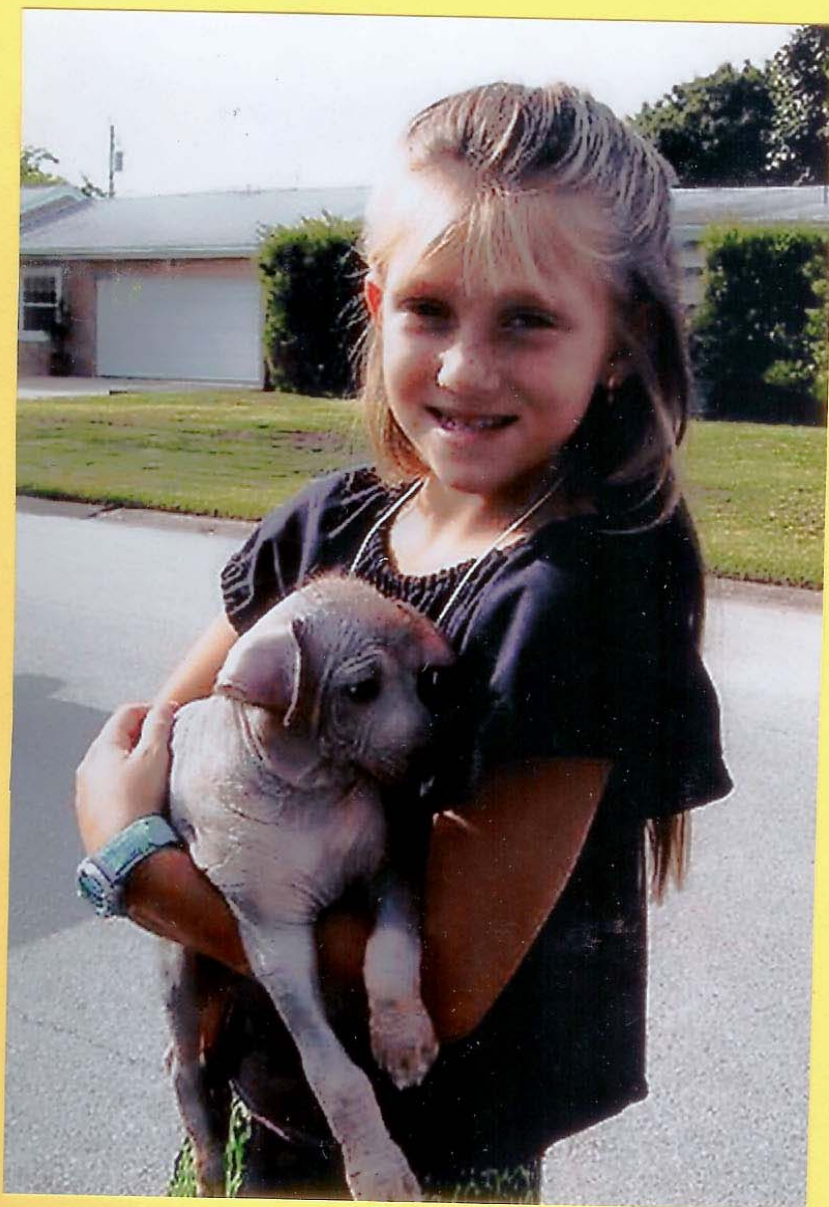

"If you ever want to pick up a guy," she said with a laugh, "bring one of these."

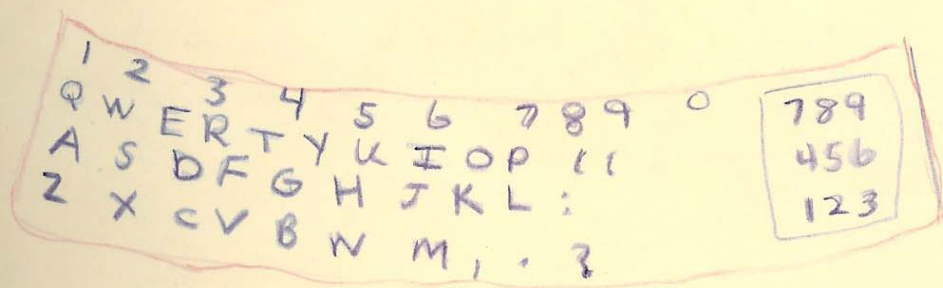
She said she brought him so he could socialize with other dogs and people.


